## Invention of E-Mail



- Ray Tomlinson is credited with inventing e-mail in 1971.
  He used the @ sign to separate the username from the server name
- At first, e-mail address looked like this: ray@mail
- After DNS was invented in 1983, they added the .com/etc to the end of e-mail address and that's how we get joe@gmail.com
- He doesn't remember what the contents of the first e-mail message that actually worked contained, but he thinks it might have just been the entire top row of letters on the keyboard.

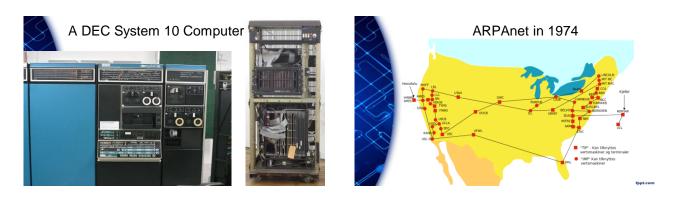

## Invention of E-Mail

When he showed a co-worker the e-mail, his co-worker told him "Don't tell anyone! This isn't what we're supposed to be working on".

Tomlinson said he preferred "email" over "e-mail", joking in a 2010 interview that "I'm simply trying to conserve the world's supply of hyphens" and that "the term has been in use long enough to drop the hyphen".



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#### Spam

- The first "junk e-mail" was sent on May 3, 1978.
- Gary Thuerk sent a message to 400 of the 2,600 that were on the ARPAnet at the time.
- He annoyed A LOT of them, but actually had some success in getting some people interested in his message.
- He was basically inviting people to see a presentation about a brand new computer system called the DECSYSTEM 20

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### Spam - Continued

The Defense Communications Agency, the group that ran the ARPAnet, called Thuerk's boss and registered a very strong complaint given that the 56 kb size of the email sent to so many people caused a significant workload to the small Internet at the time.

 Although he wasn't fired, he did think that his message was more important than the baby announcements and other personal trivia he had been sent in the past.

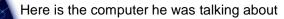
Here is the actual e-mail



Richard Stallman, on of those who helped develop the Internet system, first said "I didn't receive the DEC message, but I can't imagine I would have been bothered if I have. I get tons of uninteresting mail, and system announcements about babies born, etc."

However, after seeing a copy of the message, he changed his mind and said "...that no one should be allowed to send a message that long, no matter what it was about..."
